

Philip Taber (b. 1675), of Dartmouth, Mass., was selectman, town clerk, justice of peace and Baptist Minister. He died in Tiverton, R. I.

→ Joseph Blodgett (b. 1696), of Brimfield, Mass., was an assessor, 1731-1752, and representative, 1759. He was born in Woburn, Mass.

→ Samuel Blodgett (1633-1720), of Woburn, Mass., was commissioner, selectman and Deputy to the General Court. He was born in England.

John Farnham (Farnam), of Killingworth, Conn., was a founder of Dorchester and Windsor, Mass., and a member of an artillery company, 1644. He was born in England.

Robert Hicks (Hix) (d. 1647), of Plymouth, Mass., was an original landed proprietor, 1623.

Hester Mahieu (Matthieu), of Plymouth, Mass., a Huguenot refugee, came in the Mayflower with her husband, Francis Cooke.

Samuel Nichols (1720-1806), of Brimfield, Mass., was a selectman, 1759-61-67-68-71, and signer of the Revolution pact, July 1, 1774.

William Nichols was one of the original settlers of Brimfield, Mass.

Thomas Ruck (Rucke) was an original landed proprietor of Charlestown, and a town officer of Salem, Mass.

James Sisson (d. 1734), of Dartmouth, Mass., was a member of grand jury, selectman, 1689, and took the Oath of Fidelity, 1686. He was born in Dartmouth, Mass.

Peter Farnham, Jr. (1689-1777) was lieutenant of the Killingworth, Connecticut militia, prior to 1776.

William Wood (d. 1697) took the Oath of Allegiance in Dartmouth, Mass., March 24, 1685.

John Wood (d. 1655), of Massachusetts, was an original landed proprietor of Lynn, Mass., 1628, and freeman, 1640. He was born in England; died in Portsmouth, R. I.

Robert Lane (d. 1718), of Killingworth, Conn., was Deputy to the General Assembly, member of the Colonial Assembly, 1699-1715, and Deputy to the Court of Election, 1686.

William Wilcoxson (1601-52) was a landed proprietor of Stratford, Conn., freeman, 1636, and representative of General Court at Hartford, 1647. He was born at St. Albans, England.

John Albro (1617-1712), of Portsmouth, R. I., was an original landed proprietor.

Chad (Chaddus) Browne, of Portsmouth, R. I., was first elder of the Baptist Church in America and member of committee to make peace between Massachusetts and Rhode Island.

Caleb Carr (1616-95), of Newport, R. I., was Governor, justice of General Quarterly Session and Inferior Court of Common Pleas and general treasurer. He was born in England.

Robert Carr (1614-81), of Newport, R. I., was one of the original proprietors of "Island of Conanicut" and member of the Assembly which met at his home, 1677.

Francis Cooke (d. 1663), of Plymouth, Mass., was a signer of the Mayflower Compact.

Also No. 5025.

John Danielson received the 39th land grant in Brimfield, Mass., prominent in the early history of the town and his name often appears on the record of the Church.

William Davol (Devol), of Rehoboth, Mass., was a freeman, 1653, and juryman, 1673.

John Doane (Done) (1591-1686), of Plymouth and Eastham, Mass., was Governor's Assistant, 1632-33-39, Deputy to the General Court, 1639 to 1642, and member of Plymouth military company, 1643. He was born in Cheshire, England.

Ralph Earle (1600-78), of Dartmouth, Mass., was a juryman, treasurer and captain of a troop of horse. He was born in England.

Henry Farnham (1636-1700), of Roxbury, Mass., and Killingworth, Conn., was Deputy to the General Court, 1st deacon of the Congregational Church and member of the Ancient and Honorable Artillery company. He was born in England.

Arthur Hathaway, Jr. (b. 1627), of Massachusetts, was a selectman and deputy, 1679. He was born in Marshfield, Mass.

John Masters (d. 1639), of Watertown and Cambridge, Mass., was one of the first settlers of Watertown and one of two to advise the Governor in regard to public stock. He was born in England.

John Sayles (1633-81), of Rhode Island, was town clerk, warden, treasurer of town and deputy to the General Court. He died in Providence, R. I.

Richard Sisson (1608-84) was a freeman, 1653, member of the grand jury, 1667, and surveyor of highways at Dartmouth, Mass., 1671.

Philip Taber (Tabor) (d. 1672) was appointed on committee to make equal division of planting land, Yarmouth, Mass., deputy, 1639-40, commissioner, 1660-61-63, on committee to raise money for the
